Survival tips for parents of young instrumentalists.

Your Child's Music lesson.



- Take notes at every lesson.
- On the way home from the lesson, ask the child to tell you what he/she had learned.
- Record the child's exact words when you get home. If the child can verbalise what he/she is supposed to practice then he/she will make a good attempt at getting their music homework done properly.
- Use the notes you took yourself at the lesson. You can keep a record of them on your computer by typing the main points and using the different fonts and highlighters on your computer to

stress key words. The page can be printed as necessary for the child or you can make a book or a folder of the notes. Your computer is a very useful tool. Use it to its full potential!

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Everything is Relative:
